









Why DOCAT?

DOCAT—a CAT that is out to change the world.

Pope Francis repeatedly encourages us to go out into the world, to the peripheries of society and to minister to those in need. Where do you go as a teacher to quickly find out? How do you address the social concerns students are inundated with every day via social media? What *are* the Social Teachings of the Church? How do we apply Gospel values to poverty, imbalance of wealth, employment or unemployment, the use of natural resources and environmental concerns, or terrorism and immigration to name a few issues?





As a DRE, are you scrambling to find a list of Church documents you can assign as reading to your teachers and catechists in hope of finding an answer? Or maybe you haven't tried because the dreaded task was too overwhelming.

DOCAT, along with the companion DOCAT Study Guide, can be used as a core-curriculum text for the teaching of Social Issues or it can be used as a quick reference supplement for any existing social curriculum in use. One thing is sure, there's nothing like DOCAT already on the market that can comprehensively address Catholic Social Teaching for young people.


YOUCAT Confirmation Course
